2 Definitions

Bi-cultural approach refers to an action a person or wider collective could take to uphold Te Tiriti o Waitangi in relationships and shared responsibilities when engaging and supporting Māori and Tauiwi (non-Māori) in the health and wellbeing sector. Health or wellbeing setting includes but is not limited to – the aged care, acute care, community support, disability, mental health, social services, and youth development sectors.

Kāwanatanga refers to government or to govern.

Ōritetanga refers to have equal outcomes, equality.

Organisational policies and procedures are the policies, procedures, and methodologies of an organisation. They include legislative and regulatory requirements which may apply across an organisation, a specific site, or a workplace. Requirements are documented in organisational health and safety plans, contract work programmes, quality assurance programmes, policies, and procedural documents.

Support refers to the maintenance, improvement, or restoration, of a person's independence by utilising existing strengths and appropriate resources and may include providing assistance to enable a person's health and wellbeing needs to be met.

Tangata whai ora refers to a person seeking wellness.

Te Tiriti o Waitangi represents the te reo Māori version or an approved English translation of the Māori version of Te Tiriti o Waitangi. Articles of Te Tiriti o Waitangi are Kāwanatanga, Tino Rangatiratanga, and Ōritetanga.

Tino Rangatiratanga refers to having sovereignty, self-determination.

Mana Tangata refers to a person's values and rights.
