Guidance Information

1 Assessment

This unit standard is intended to align with the *New Zealand Certificate in Concrete Construction Skills - Specifications* and the New Zealand Certificate in Concrete Construction Skills (Level 3) [Ref: 4189].

Evidence for this standard must reflect commercial standards.

Commercial standards refer to verbal and written information covering company policy, standard operating procedures and processes, and job-specific instructions.

Working to commercial standards refers to the ability to consistently:

- perform standard processes to current industry standards, on demand and within a commercially acceptable timeframe;
- perform non-standard processes to current industry standards, on demand and within a commercially acceptable timeframe, under the supervision of a commercially competent practitioner.

Working to commercial standards must be confirmed by a person with current expertise in concrete construction.

2 Definitions

Finishing refers to a combination of levelling (screeding), floating, troweling and other treatments

Specified finishes refers to finishes described in NZS 3114:1987 or those specified by the designer or engineer and may include decorative, imprinted or coloured. *Workplace procedures* refers to the documented procedures specific to a workplace that set out the standards and required practices of that workplace.
