Purpose

People credited with this unit standard are able to: describe the factors that influence the brain development of kukune/foetus from conception to birth, and describe the factors that influence a mokopuna/child's brain development and lifelong learning across the early years.

This unit standard has been developed primarily for assessment within programmes leading to the New Zealand Certificate in Early Learning and Care (Level 2) [Ref: 4338].

This unit standard is an introduction to early learning and life skills. It is designed for people who care for young children in parenting roles, or as support for carers of infants, toddlers and/or young children in a supervised environment.

- This standard recognises that patterns of children's development are integrally interwoven, and development is different for every mokopuna/child. It also considers the significance of the period from conception to two years (*the First 1000 days of Life*), and the impacts on brain development and lifelong learning.
- Assessment evidence for this standard may include examples of the underpinning of Te Tiriti o Waitangi and threading te reo Māori and tikanga Māori through descriptions of factors that influence a mokopuna/child's brain development and lifelong learning.
- 3 Definition
 - The First 1,000 days of life is the period from conception to two years, a unique period when the foundations of optimum health, growth, and neurodevelopment across the lifespan are established.
- 4 Legislation includes but is not limited to: Care of Children Act 2004 Children's Act 2014 and subsequent amendments.

2.1 Factors that influence the mokopuna/child's brain development across the early years are described.

Range

factors include but are not limited to – secure attachment; nutrition; sights, sounds and experiences; holistic wellbeing of mother/caregiver; sleep; stress; must include – birth to two years of age; three to five years of age.

2.2 Interactions are described in terms of how they influence mokopuna/children's lifelong learning and development.

Range interactions include – people, places, things.
