Guidance Information

- 1 The basic principles underpinning tikanga are common, but while there are some constants, the details of performance of tikanga, and their explanation, may differ. These differences may be at a whānau, hapū, iwi, marae or rohe level. The context of the learning should include the tikanga of the local mana whenua (if capable) but learning others' tikanga is also encouraged.
- 2 Definitions

Koroneihana hui refers to a significant gathering in Māori culture that commemorates the coronation anniversary of the Māori King or Queen. Held at Tūrangawaewae Marae, it brings together Māori tribes and communities to honour and unite under the monarchy of the Kingitanga movement. The event features cultural performances, speeches, and rituals showcasing Māori customs and heritage. Attendees pay respects, discuss important matters, and celebrate Māori identity. The Koroneihana hui serves as a platform for cultural preservation, strengthening relationships, and affirming the ongoing significance of the Māori monarchy in Māori society, fostering unity and shared values.

Te Paki o Matariki refers to the coat of arms (and official standard) of the Kingitanga.
