Communication is not hindered by inconsistencies.			

Guidance Information

- This unit standard can be awarded with an Achieved, Merit, or Excellence grade. For the Achieved grade to be awarded, the outcome must be achieved as specified in the outcome statement. For Merit or Excellence grades to be awarded, the learner must meet the Merit or Excellence criteria specified above.
- 2 Gagana Tokelau refers to the authentic language of Tokelau as communicated in the Pacific Island nation and in New Zealand.

- 3 It is recommended that:
 - i the outcomes are assessed as part of an integrated unit of work, relevant to the learning context of the candidate;
 - ii assessment be conducted in conjunction with assessment against other Gagana Tokelau unit standards at this level.
- The presentation must be primarily spoken and be the learner's own work. Cue cards and visual aids can be used to serve as a memory aid to support the delivery. Visuals may include a minimal amount of written text, which should not be assessed as part of this standard. Learners may not read their presentation in its entirety. Appropriate presentation techniques, such as visuals, may be used.
- The quality of the spoken presentation considered as a whole is more important than the length:
 - i it must be long enough to generate sufficient evidence for quality assessment;
 - ii suggested time is three minutes (excluding the traditional greeting or personal introduction);
 - iii must relate to a community context and may include but is not limited to cultural practices; telling a story and/or stories; reflecting on celebrations of Vaiaho Gagana Tokelau (language week), cultural festival, community events and/or celebrations; family and/or identity; exploring societal and environmental issues.

- 7 Definitions

Audience refers to two or more persons. This could be either face-to-face and/or an online audience.

Community context refers to content that explores an issue, concept, experience, cultural practice or situation with societal relevance.

Explore refers to developing information and in-depth ideas.

Justify refers to giving explanations and evidence to support or challenge ideas and perspectives.

Language features include the way words work in sentences. For example:

- verb tense markers such as:
 - o kua indicates that the event had happened, e.g., Ko te aoga kua uma.
 - o ka signals something that is yet to happen, e.g., Ko te aoga ka uma.
 - o e signposts something that is in progress, e.g., Ko te aoga e heki uma.
- specific verb patterns to express future intention or singular and plural verb forms.
