Explanatory notes

Glossary

Mātauranga Māori is inclusive of all ages and is whānau supported, modelled and monitored. It is within this context that this unit standard has been developed for Māori adults.

The term *Māori* is used generically, but with caution to avoid maintaining or perpetuating stereotypes and homogenous approaches to Māori development.

Te ao tūroa refers to the environment, the natural world.

Te ao hurihuri refers to the modern world.

Whānau includes whāngai.

Outcomes and evidence requirements

Outcome 1

Discuss Māori human development theory in relation to the health and well-being of adults.

Evidence requirements

- 1.1 The health and well-being of adult men and women is discussed in relation to wairua, tinana, hinengaro, whatumanawa, and ngā kare-ā-roto.
- 1.2 The health and well-being of adult men and women is discussed in relation to their whānau and whakapapa.

Outcome 2

Discuss the relationship between whenua and adults.

Evidence requirements

- 2.1 The development of adult men and women is discussed in relation to tūrangawaewae, iwi and to Aotearoa.
- Range wairua, waiora, tinana, hinengaro, whatumanawa, ngā kare-ā-roto.

Outcome 3

Discuss the relationship between te ao tūroa, te ao hurihuri and adults.

Evidence requirements

- 3.1 The development of adult men and women is discussed in relation to te ao tūroa, te ao hurihuri their tūrangawaewae, iwi and Aotearoa.
- Range wairua, waiora, tinana, hinengaro, whatumanawa, ngā kare-ā-roto.
