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### Guidance Information

- 1 Where the local rohe is occupied by whānau, hapū, and/or iwi, the tangata whenua or mana whenua view should take precedence. Other iwi or hapū views should be encouraged in order to enrich and enhance understanding of key Māori concepts and practices.
- 2 *Aroha* – was described by the late John Rangihau (Tūhoe) as the main underpinning concept that bound all aspects of Māoritanga together. *Aroha* may be defined as empathy and love. *Aroha* is an attitude and an important cultural value of the Māori, derived from a particular Māori view of te taiao and the place of Māori within it. *Aroha* is an important concept that underpins how whānau, hapū and/or iwi take care of te taiao.
- 3 Assessment against this unit standard can be conducted in a number of ways that may include but is not limited to – oral presentations, visual presentations, written presentations, whakaari, waiata, haka.

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### Outcomes and Performance criteria

#### Outcome 1
