 - tapiki is tidy and the raranga tension is consistent;
 - handles are evenly placed with appropriate lengths for the kete purpose.

- 4 Demonstrate artistic skills to raranga kete whiri will be evidenced through:
 - demonstrating tight weave;
 - level top tapiki;
 - handles are tight, the same widths, shape and sized lengths for the kete purpose;
 - description of stages of kete whiri development show an in-depth understanding.

- 6 Definitions

Kete whiri refers to a kete commenced with a plaited whiri base.

Quality ensures whenu is graded to complete kete whiri. Includes but is not limited to broken, infected or discoloured rau.

Quantity ensures enough whenu are prepared to complete kete whiri.

Size ensures whenu are a consistent width and length.

Tapiki is to lock off, turn in of the strands of weaving otherwise referred to as casting off.

Te Whare Pora – a house or place that is set aside to teach and conserve the art of weaving.

7 Referencing

Referencing of all sources of information is encouraged.

Referencing will prepare ākonga for the requirements of academic writing.
