- 5 Demonstrate artistic skills to raranga kono will be evidenced through:
 - kono has no gaps and is of an exceptional standard;
 - tapiki is balanced.

Akonga will keep a documented photographic visual diary or workbook to assist with assessment and authenticity.

7 Definitions

Quality ensures whenu is graded to complete kono. Includes but is not limited to broken, infected or discoloured rau.

Quantity ensures sufficient amounts of whenu are prepared to complete kono. Size ensures whenu are a consistent width and length.

Tapiki is to lock off, turn in of the strands of weaving otherwise referred to as casting off.

Te Whare Pora – a house or place that is set aside to teach and conserve the art of weaving.

8 Referencing

Referencing of all sources of information is encouraged.

Referencing will prepare akonga for the requirements of academic writing.
